A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

DEAR CENTER COMMUNITY,

Over 50 years ago, the founders of The San Diego LGBT Community Center had a vision: to build power for LGBTQ+ people by creating safe spaces where we can dream, strategize, and act. Today, we are one of the largest and most impactful LGBTQ+ centers in the country, advocating for our rights, responding to emerging crises, providing essential services, and creating safe spaces that welcome and affirm the diversity across our community.

This year, the 2024 Presidential Election results urge us to strengthen the organizational and community power that has fueled progress for our LGBTQ+ community over the last few decades. As we face an administration that has already promised to terminate gender-affirming care, reinstate the transgender military ban, and enact mass deportations, we must leverage and deepen that community power to continue our fight and ensure our hard-won gains are not



lost. Despite the weight of the election and the challenges ahead, The Center remains steadfast in serving our community. As I reflect on our achievements this year, I am reminded of our strength, and I am fueled by both hope and determination to continue our vital work.

During the past fiscal year, The Center reached several important milestones. We celebrated at our joyous and momentous 50th Anniversary Gala, and launched our LGBTQ+ Luminaries Lunch to honor people making an impact in our community. We mourned the loss of The Center's first woman executive director, trailblazer Jeri Dilno, and we strengthened our commitment to serving the most vulnerable folks in our community by expanding our Crisis Services team and launching our ninth housing program, Adult Housing Services. Through it all, I am grateful for our supporters who were there with us every step of the way.

The Center continued to provide engagement opportunities and direct services for our LGBTQ+ community. We hosted a fabulous Kiki Ball and held a movie screening of Rustin through our Black Services program, hosted a Dia de los Muertos altar and our annual Pachanga de Frida party through Latin@x Services, and launched a new Lunar New Year Celebration and other special events to highlight our Asian American Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander community. Our Behavioral Health Services and Sexual Health and Wellness program provided access to LGBTQ-affirming care to promote mental and physical wellness. We added new programming for seniors and youth, as well as for our transgender and nonbinary community.

In addition to our services, our Fierce Advocacy and Civic Engagement (FACE) Team has been driving efforts to build LGBTQ+ community power in our region. During the last year, our FACE Team continued to recruit motivated volunteers and advocate for legislation that protects LGBTQ+ people, helping to secure a victory with Prop 3 to protect marriage equality in California. Our efforts to Get Out The Vote mobilized voters to the polls. More than 5,000 voters came to The Center for the November General Election to drop off their ballot or vote at the only LGBTQ+ Vote Center in our region—a triumph in civic engagement that, despite any election results, will help us drive progress moving forward.

As the CEO of The Center, I am filled with immense pride for the work The Center has done and the many lives changed this year. I am also filled with deep gratitude for our staff, donors, and volunteers who make our impact possible. Your generous support and active engagement have made a real difference for our San Diego LGBTQ+ community. 2025 is going to be a challenging year and we will need your continued support and involvement to protect our community. Together, we can stand shoulder to shoulder and pave the way forward so Our Center continues to foster hope and unity.

The San Diego LGBT Community Center is dedicated to enhancing and sustaining the health and well-being of the LGBTQ+ community in San Diego. In the past fiscal year, The Center provided over 90,000 service visits to our community, marking a 16% increase from the previous year.

Direct Services for Essential Support

The Center offers a wide range of direct services designed to meet the immediate needs of our community members. Empowering Through Advocacy and Community Engagement

Our Advocacy and Civic Engagement and Communications departments work through strategic communications and community engagement to amplify the voices of the LGBTQ+ community and drive systemic change. By being a trusted messenger and engaging in coalition work, educating political leaders, and mobilizing voters, we strive to ensure that our community's needs and values are represented at all levels of government.

Housing Services—The Center provides a housing continuum of nine programs from emergency housing and support services to permanant and supportive housing.

Crisis Support Services—A team dedicated to supporting our community members in crisis and offering referrals, assistance, and compassion.

Food Resources—We host two monthly food banks, regular events featuring free meals at The Center, as well as Project Compassion offering direct supportive resources to our unhoused community members.

Training Institute—The Center's Training Institute is a leading provider of high-quality professional trainings on LGBTQ+ topics like pronouns, gender and nonbinary identities, LGBTQ-affirming deescalation techniques for front line responders, LGBTQ+ sexual health, and more.

50TH ANNIVERSARY GALA

On Saturday, October 14, 2023, The Center celebrated 50 years of service to our community at our 50th Anniversary Gala! We have undergone tremendous changes — from building a sexual health and wellness program that grew from responding to the AIDS crisis, creating a world-class housing continuum that sprang from the need to take in LGBTQ+ youth who were kicked out of their homes, to developing a high impact Advocacy and Civic Engagement program that responds swiftly and decisively to attacks against our community.



Building on the foundation of Latin@x Services established in 2004, we have expanded our community programs to meet evolving needs, including the launch of Project TRANS in 2013 and Black Services in 2021. All of these robust programs and so many more have allowed The Center to be able to pivot to proactively provide care for our community throughout San Diego County, and to imagine a future where our strength is reflected in our spaces and in our programs so that our community can thrive against whatever lies ahead.

We were able to do all of this because of the generosity of Center Supporters like you. We look forward to being here for our community for the next 50 years and beyond.




































SEXUAL HEALTH & WELLNESS: A DECADE OF #BETHEGENERATION

In 2014, The Center launched the groundbreaking #BeTheGeneration campaign, an aggressive and strategic effort to end new HIV transmissions in San Diego, prompted by medical evidence and offering a much-needed new opportunity to stop HIV as an epidemic.

Today, #BeTheGeneration has evolved into an entire program that focuses on Sexual Health and Wellness for the LGBTQ+ community and beyond. The Center has built strong collaborative partnerships with Family Health Centers of San Diego, Vista Community Clinics, San Ysidro Health Centers, Planned Parenthood of the Pacific Southwest, and UC San Diego that allows our clients a seamless link to immediate sexual health treatment and prevention support as well as long-term medical care and supplemental services that help sustain and enhance quality of life.

Thanks to our community's advocacy and investments over nearly 40 years, we have made incredible advancements in HIV care. HIV medication, and pre-exposure and post-exposure treatments (PrEP and PEP) are now available, and we have made great strides in reducing the rate of HIV transmission. People living with HIV who are in care are likely to live long and healthy lives. There has been a steady decline in new HIV cases in San Diego County, thanks to targeted efforts like The Center's #BeTheGeneration campaign.



Today HIV is a treatable condition. Yet, the latest data from the county tells us that there is still a tremendous need to reach Black, Latin@x, and younger LGBTQ people, as we see a new generation of LGBTQ+ Black and Latin@x community members who are disproportionately represented in new HIV cases in San Diego.

Our latest #BeTheGeneration campaign aims to create targeted messaging for underrepresented communities, including people who identify with our Black, Latin@x, AANHPI, women, transgender, and nonbinary communities. By highlighting statistics for each community, our goal is to educate folks about getting tested, prevention through PrEP, and treatment options.

A decade after #BeTheGeneration was launched, we must continue to find ways to reach our vulnerable community members so that HIV transmissions can reach zero in San Diego County.



ADVOCACY & CIVIC ENGAGEMENT: BUILDING LGBTQ+ COMMUNITY POWER

Advocacy and Civic Engagement

For the past 50 years, The Center has strived to build LGBTQ+ power and amplify the diverse voices within our region by conducting robust civic engagement to ensure our elected officials represent our community and our values. Our Advocacy and Civic Engagement department is dedicated to building community power through strategic partnerships, coalition work, and proactive community engagement.

This focus is instrumental in ensuring that our community's voices are heard and represented in the political arena. Our efforts include participating in progressive movements and advocating for immigrant rights, racial justice, reproductive justice, and more. As we face the challenges ahead, our team is ready to mobilize to fight misinformation and anti-LGBTQ legislation.

Key Activities and Successes in FY24

Voter Mobilization: Over the last year, our team has mobilized thousands of voters to Get Out The Vote, strategically building a dedicated group of volunteers excited about civic engagement over the last few election cycles to prepare for the November 2024 election.

Coalition Work: We have participated in various coalitions aligned with other progressive movements, including immigrant rights, workers' rights, racial justice, reproductive justice, and environmental justice. These collaborations amplify the collective power of our intersectional movements for justice while building strategic partnerships.





FACE Team: We have built a solid base of dedicated, passionate volunteers through events like Advocacy Trivia Nights, which infused themed trivia with political knowledge. Many attendees are now part of our Fierce Advocacy and Civic Engagement (FACE) Team, contributing to our civic engagement efforts and empowering our community to vote.

Community Engagement: Our dynamic, proactive, and responsive strategies engage the entire San Diego LGBTQ+ community, prioritizing those not yet connected to The Center's services or programs. We foster relationships with diverse stakeholders to ensure they are part of our decision-making, advocacy, and initiatives.

Celebrations and Events: We celebrated our annual LGBT Veterans Wall of Honor ceremony, recognizing LGBTQ+ military veterans with ties to San Diego. We also created new opportunities to reach our Asian American Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (AANHPI) community, including The Center's Lunar New Year Community Celebration and a book reading by Kumu Huna, a Native Hawaiian third gender activist and author.



Hillcrest and Beyond: Recognizing the importance of uplifting LGBTQ+ people throughout San Diego County, we have prioritized engagement in areas like East County and North County, where legislative attacks are prevalent. This year, we collaborated with San Ysidro Health, Neighborhood Healthcare, and Health Center Partners on the My Vote My Health campaign, calling thousands of low-propensity Latino/a/x voters to encourage them to vote. Our work reaching out to low-propensity voters as part of the My Vote My Health campaign is an important step in empowering voters impacted by marginalization, redlining, and gentrification. Each conversation with a voter who pledged to vote signifies an investment in their communities, families, and selves, highlighting the impact of our work.

Advocating to Protect LGBTQ+ Students:

The SAFETY Act was introduced in the California legislature to strengthen protections against forced outings of LGBTQ+ students in schools. The bill prohibits a public school employee or contractor from being required to disclose a student's gender identity/expression or sexual orientation to anyone without the student's consent, unless otherwise required by law. The Center's Advocacy and Civic Engagement team created awareness for the bill and supported the SAFETY Act to help it become California law.



THE CENTER'S HOUSING CONTINUUM

ADULT HOUSING SERVICES



At The Center, we believe that having a safe, stable place to call home is fundamental to everyone's well-being and we are proud to serve our entire community, regardless of their immigration status. People need a safe place to live before they can address other needs, like finding employment or improving their health. By ensuring as many community members as possible have stable housing. we create a healthier, stronger community that is more engaged in civic life.

Since our launch last year, Adult Housing Services at The Center has provided our LGBTQ+ community with

housing assistance and navigation. This program focuses on people ages 18 and over, providing resources in emergency, transitional, and permanent housing solutions, along with a range of housing assistance services. Adult Housing Services is part of our housing continuum at The Center, which now includes nine programs from homelessness prevention to permanent supportive housing, providing essential support to those experiencing housing crises.

Our services are comprehensive and tailored to meet the needs of each individual. We assist people in finding housing and offer personalized services, including advocating for tenants' rights, negotiating rents, helping with lease agreements, and mediating between landlords and tenants. Additionally, we assist with essentials like move-in costs, first month's rents/deposits, utility payments, employment, and other essentials for housing stability. We ensure every person is treated with dignity and respect by conducting quality inspections and locating clean, habitable housing.

Our work addresses the needs of unhoused individuals, those with financial barriers and debt, and anyone needing assistance and resources with unstable housing situations.

PROGRAMS INCLUDE:

EMERGENCY HOUSING & SUPPORT SERVICES

Homelessness Prevention & Diversion—Designed to assist individuals and families in the County who are facing housing instability or are unhoused.

Family Reunification Program— Reconnects LGBTQ+ youth with their families, while all receive counseling and supportive services.

Host Home Program—Identifies, screens, and trains community members known to youth 18-24 who are willing to host them in their homes.

Project Compassion—A tangible, action-based program that offers direct supportive resources for those experiencing homelessness.

LGBTQ Safe STAY Wellness Center—An LGBTQ-affirming emergency shelter for transitional age youth ages 18-24.

Adult Housing Services— Empowering adults and seniors through a range of housing and wellbeing services.

PERMANENT & SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

Karibu—Scattered-site permanent housing for those 18 and older.

Sunburst Youth Housing Project
—Safe and supportive housing for homeless youth between 18-24, with a special focus on LGBTQ+ and youth living with HIV.

North Park Senior Apartments
—In partnership with Community
HousingWorks, we opened San
Diego's first LGBTQ-affirming
affordable senior complex where
The Center provides on-site case
management and support services
to the residents.











A NEW HOME FOR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

The Behavioral Health Services (BHS) department at The Center has provided mental health services to our LGBTQ+ community since 1986. BHS has evolved over the years to become one of the largest departments at The Center due to the growing and vital need for welcoming and affirming mental health services in our community. LGBTQ+ people of all ages disproportionately experience increased instances of mental health issues, substance use disorders, and behavioral health stressors and crises. Barriers to health care, including access to LGBTQ-affirming care, are at the root of our LGBTQ+ community's need for more support for our mental health.

The Center's BHS team offers individual, couples/family, and group counseling to LGBTQ+ community members. Services cater to specific needs of our LGBTQ+ community members, including help with samegender/genderqueer relationship violence, support for youth and adults who are victims of crime and/or hate incidents, gender affirming care for trans/nonbinary community members, and support for individuals, couples and families living with HIV/AIDS.

(he/him) is a Alex transgender youth who had been hospitalized for suicidal ideation, symptoms of major depressive disorder. and gender dysphoria. With the help of our BHS counselor, Alex developed the tools to work through feelings of gender dysphoria, and developed safer coping skills. Alex is now equipped to handle anxious and depressive thoughts episodes, and has developed strong peer relationships at his new school. Clients like Alex remind us of the importance of LGBTQ-affirming care



50+ AND BETTER TOGETHER: SENIOR SERVICES AT THE CENTER

50+ and Better Together is the Senior Services program at The Center, providing programs and services for LGBTQ+ community members 50 and older to connect, make friends, stay healthy, and build a network to fight isolation.



AGELESS ARTISTS ART SHOW AND FAIR RETURNS

We uplifted the power of creativity and the vibrant and artistic talents of our LGBTQ+ community, showcasing the remarkable works of art created by members of the Ageless Art Group at The Center.

LGBTQ+ HEALTH SYMPOSIUM & RESOURCE FAIR

The Center hosted our first LGBTQ+ Health Symposium to discuss topics of interest to our senior community, including long-term care options, navigating the health care system, health care challenges for LGBTQ+ adults, and how to stay connected to address isolation and loneliness.



AROUND THE TABLE WITH ELDERS

This six-week group nutrition program for older adults focused on building resilience through nourishment of body, mind, and community connections. Participants learned to build healthy nutrition habits to enhance health and wellbeing.

AGING WITH HIV

This in-person, all-day workshop was presented in partnership with Pozabilities, The Reunion Project, Gilead, and The Center. Attendees gained insights about the latest advances in HIV and aging, prevention, and treatment.

CHAIR YOGA AND FITNESS

Seniors looking for more opportunities to practice wellness were welcome to join us at our one-hour chair exercise class twice a month at The Center. The Chair Yoga and Fitness class features a small workout including yoga and Zumba.



GREY MATTERS MOVEMENT AND MUSIC

With the popularity of our Feeling Fit class, we added more options to keep seniors active, including Grey Matters Movement and Music, a program dedicated to enhancing the well-being of seniors. This class takes place twice a month at The Center, in partnership with Grey Matters Studio.

In June 2022, we received news that Center supporters Maurice Thimot and Rust Rawnsley had left a historic gift to The Center through our planned giving program, The Stonewall Society. This amazing gay couple has created a legacy for our community's future, directing The Center to establish The Maurice Thimot and M. Rust Rawnsley Fund, which will be used to intentionally create spaces and programs for our community, with a special focus on our LGBTQ seniors. We received the first distribution of \$10M in June 2022, and in September 2024 we received the remainder of the Estate Gift in two distributions, \$8,789,562 and \$116,904. The total amount of the gift received is \$18,906,466.







THE CENTER'S HISTORY

1971-1972

The initial 1971-1972 Planning Committee for what would become The Center included Patricia Byers, Thom Carey, Patricia Cluchey, Peggy Heathers, Jess Jessop, Clint Johnson, Bernie Michels, George Murphy, Jerry Peterson, Gary Rees, John Senter, Jerry White, John Eberly, Gary Gulley and Cynthia Lawrence. The Chair of the Planning Committee was Bernie Michels.

1973

The Center for Social Services was incorporated as a 501c3.

1980

The Center for Social Services became the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center.

1981

Diagnosis of the first case of HIV disease in San Diego County.

1986

Behavioral Health Services at The Center established.

1998

The Behavioral Health Services RVTIP program received credentialing, and became one of the first same-sex domestic violence programs in the nation.

1999

The Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center moved from Normal Street to Centre Street and began plans for renovations.

2000

The Hillcrest Youth Center opened its doors and became a critical resource for LGBTQ+ youth in San Diego.

2001

Dr. Delores A. Jacobs named interim Executive Director June 2001 and is selected as Executive Director in January 2002. Jacobs serves a historic, 17year tenure as the longest serving chief executive, and retired on June 30, 2018.



2001

The Public Policy department was established after the No on Prop. 22 campaign.

2002

The Lesbian and Gay Men's Center was renamed The San Diego Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender Community Center.

2003

The Women's Resource Center was established, providing LBT women and their allies access to important health and social resources and referrals.

2003

AIDS Walk & Run San Diego returned to The Center as a Center program.

2003

Senior Services and 50 and Better Together were established, providing important health, financial and social resources for LGBTQ seniors.

2003

Under the leadership of Dr. Delores Jacobs and Robert Gleason, The Community Leadership Council was established, bringing together more than 40 LGBTQ+ and allied community organizations each month to address the needs of the community.

2004

Latin@x Services was established, providing a culturally-affirming drop-in space, support groups, and social programs for our LGBTQ+ Latin@x community.



2004

The Wall of Honor was established, honoring community members and allies who have had a significant positive impact on the San Diego LGBTQ+ community.

2006

Sunburst Youth Housing Project opened, providing supportive housing for 23 unhoused LGBTQ+ and HIV+ youth, ages 18-24.



2007

The Center Advocacy Project was established, a nonpartisan 501c4, whose mission is to secure equal civil and human rights for the LGBTQ+ and allied communities through public education and issue advocacy.

2007

Family programming was re-established at The Center, providing programs and services for LGBTQ-headed families and those considering parenthood.

2008

The Equality Voters program was established to encourage community-wide voter registration and full, non-partisan, participation in elections.

2009

Nicole Murray Ramirez, Robert Gleason, Dr. Delores Jacobs, The San Diego LGBT Community Center, and a broad coalition of civic and business leaders established the first Harvey Milk Diversity Breakfast. Since then it has grown to become one of the largest, most diverse events of its kind, bringing together more than 1,000 San Diegans annually.

2010

Engage San Diego was established, forming a nonprofit network of local civil rights, social justice, health and environmental organizations focused on nonpartisan civic engagement.



2010

The Center became a monthly distribution site for the San Diego Food Bank.

2011

Senior Housing Needs Assessment completed.



2012

Founded by CEO Dr. Delores Jacobs, Young Professionals Council (YPC) is a program of The Center that fosters a culture of diversity, service, leadership, advocacy and camaraderie among emerging LGBTQ+ leaders in the San Diego region, typically between 21-40 years of age. Through a service learning model that expands on people's leadership and network, members have the opportunity to get plugged into and grow within The Center and the LGBTQ+ justice movement at large.

2012

The Center began working with Community Housing Works to establish an LGBTQ-welcoming affordable senior housing project in San Diego.

2012

The Benjamin F. Dillingham, III and Bridget Wilson LGBT Veterans Wall of Honor, first envisioned by Nicole Murray-Ramirez, and co-created by CEO Dr. Delores Jacobs, was established in 2012 to honor and celebrate LGBTQ+ veterans who have served our country.

2013

Project TRANS was established to provide services designed specifically for San Diego's transgender, nonbinary, and gender nonconforming community.



2014

The #BeTheGeneration campaign launched, with the goal of ending new cases of HIV within a decade.



2016

The #BeTheGeneration TRANS campaign launched.

2016

Construction begins on The North Park Senior Apartments, an affordable LGBTQ-welcoming housing project.

2017

The Center's Youth Services opened the South Bay Clubhouse, a weekly drop-in space for LGBTQ+ youth in Chula Vista, which in 2019 became South Bay Youth Center.

2017

At The Center's 45th Anniversary Gala, a \$2 million dollar matching campaign opportunity was announced.

2017

Dr. Delores Jacobs announced her intended retirement from The Center. Led by Board Co-Chair Joyce Rowland, The Center launched a nationwide search that solicited feedback on characteristics sought in the new Center chief executive. More than 200 interviews and focus groups were conducted.

2018

North Park Senior Apartments, the LGBTQwelcoming affordable senior housing project, opens.



2018

The Center reaches \$2 million fundraising goal. Matching donors Ron Bowman, with his husband Stan Zukowfsky, announce a second gift of \$1.65 million to pay off the mortgage for the Centre Street building in spring of 2018.



2018

The Center Board announces selection of Caroline (Cara) Dessert, Esq. as the next Center Chief Executive Officer effective July 1, 2018.

2018-19

The Center embarked on the first border campaign to ensure that legal services, case management, and humanitarian relief were provided to LGBTQ+ and HIV-positive asylum seekers who arrived at the Mexican/U.S. border.

2019

The South Bay Youth Center (SBYC) opens in Chula Vista to support LGBTQ+ youth 10-24 and their families in need of resources in South County.



2019

The Center embarks on a Strategic Planning process, engaging a wide variety of community stakeholders to strive to serve our growing and diverse community and ensure that we maximize our organization's resources to best continue to fulfill our mission in the years ahead. 2000 community members gave feedback via surveys, focus groups, interviews, and town halls.

2019

The Center expands its housing program to an entire housing continuum, including the new LGBTQ Safe STAY Program for LGBTQ+ youth.

2019

The Center holds a Town Hall for the Black LGBTQ+ community, which leads to new anti-racism policies and initiatives at The Center and the formation of the Black LGBTQ+ Community Advisory Committee. The Center now provides anti-Black racism trainings for staff, board members, donors, and volunteers.

2020

The Center's Advocacy and Civic Engagement work includes the 2020 Elections and 2020 U.S. Census campaigns with outreach and dedicated, targeted campaigns to our community.

2020

COVID-19 hits San Diego on March 20, 2020. The Center responded to unprecedented community need for housing, food, and mental health support. The Center continued to provide emergency and critical services throughout the pandemic by expanding Crisis Services, Behavioral Health Services, and Housing Services.

2021

The Center launches a new website that is user-friendly, easy to navigate, and more intentionally showcases specific programs targeted to our LGBTQ+ community.

2021

The Center launches the Training Institute providing high-quality, professional trainings to assist organizations to strengthen their knowledge and skills in working with the LGBTQ+ community, as well as how to best serve and respect LGBTQ+ people.

2021

The Center's Youth Services staff created and launched The Youth Queer Leadership Council, a three-year leadership development program for youth comprised of three youth cohorts based on age: 12-13, 14-18, and 19-24. The program centers youth of color.



2021

Black Services at The Center is established to provide dynamic programming and direct services for San Diego's Black LGBTQ+ community.



2021

The Sunburst Youth Housing Project, that also houses Safe STAY an overnight emergency housing program for LGBTQ+ youth, received much needed renovations including new windows, cool-flat roof system, exterior patching and paint.



2021

During The Center's closure due to the pandemic, the main facility at 3909 Centre Street received upgrades including new floors, new lighting, a new welcome desk and lobby area, renovated restrooms, a new Sexual Health & Wellness Lounge, new community meeting rooms, and improvements to the sound system in the historic auditorium, as well as a new HVAC system to provide the cleanest air possible to our community.



2021

Marking the one-year of the COVID-19 pandemic, The Center holds a community ofrenda to honor those we lost.

2022

The Center expands its Sexual Health and Wellness Program to include STI screening services. The Center now offers chlamydia, gonorrhea, and syphilis screenings as well as HIV and hepatitis C testing.

2022

The Center is notified that Maurice Thimot and Rust Rawnsley had left a sizeable gift to The Center through The Center's planned giving program, The Stonewall Society. Their \$18.9M gift is the largest gift The Center has ever received.



2022

The Center purchases its first building in 16 years to become the new home of the Hillcrest Youth Center.

2022

The Center hosts an Open House in May to welcome the community back to The Center's main building once renovations were completed. The Open House brings over 400 community members to learn about The Center's programs and services.



2022

In response to the MPOX outbreak in San Diego, The Center co-hosted a community forum and held vaccinations clinics in our parking lot. The Center also launched a succesful MPOX campaign to prevent the spread of the virus.

2022

The Center gathered community to celebrate The Respect for Marriage Act which guarantees federal recognition and protection of same-sex and interracial marriages.

2023

The Hillcrest Youth Center moved to its forever home, which features multiple rooms to host activities and resources for youth, including the community closet, a game room, library, lounge, kitchenette, and a private area for therapy and HIV testing.



2023

The Center expanded LGBTQ Safe STAY from four beds to up to 21 beds for transitional age youth ages 18-24. The new LGBTQ Safe STAY Wellness Center is a space designed by and for LGBTQ+ and BIPOC youth.

2023

The Center's


